What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m?	36%	Hartlepool only has two swimming pools; demand amongst schools is high. There are limits the number of sessions a school can offer its pupils. Transport only is available between 10am – 2pm. Social deprivation is an important barrier for most of our children, school swimming lessons the only opportunity our children have to learn how to swim. Many of our children have parents who are unable to swim which can also be a barrier.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	31%	

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	100%	30 children took part in the Swim Safe programme at Seaton Carew beach. These sessions were delivered by Hartlepool Council. As our school is based in a coastal town, this programme is very important as sessions provide our children with the knowledge required to stay safe at the beach.
